# **FROM THE CEO**

After two challenging years dominated by COVID-19, 2022 saw netball start its recovery.

It was wonderful to have players back on court across the state, and we enjoyed the return of several of our major competitions which had been absent due to the pandemic.

At the same time, an incredible amount of hard work took place behind the scenes, to put Netball SA back on an even keel and allow us to once again plan for the future – to better support our great sport and everyone involved with it.

While there remains a lot of work ahead, it's appropriate that we take this opportunity to celebrate our wins over the past 12 months.

### **BACK ON COURT**

An annual highlight for so many players, our Country Championships returned in 2022. In total, 109 teams took part, fighting out more than 512 matches across a threeday weekend with a huge number of spectators coming to Netball SA Stadium. More people than ever also watched from home, with The Advertiser live streaming the event for the second year.

Our inaugural Netball on the Road program was launched, taking clinics, education sessions and development programs across the state. In our first year, more than 1,800 people attended across the four initial locations: South East, Eyre Peninsula, Murraylands and Lower North.

We enjoyed another season of great netball in The Hospital Research Foundation Premier League competition, which will only get stronger thanks to the changes put in place following our review that was completed during the year.

Importantly, The Advertiser live streamed Premier League games every round this year to provide unprecedented exposure and increased coverage of the competition. We launched our First Nations Framework, designed to outline Netball SA's ongoing contribution to increasing the participation rates and development of First Nations netballers in SA.

We also hosted more than 150 attendees at First Nations Clinics across the state, announced the 14 recipients of our inaugural First Nations Scholarship Program, collaborated in the running of Nunga Netball Carnival at Netball SA Stadium, and launched our Rising Sisters Aboriginal Netball Program.

The Adelaide Thunderbirds Talent Academy was also introduced this year, strengthening the pathway from grassroots to the elite levels for netballers aged 14-16. As a result, 12 athletes from the Academy were selected in Netball SA's 17U State Squad for 2023.





Speaking of state representation, South Australia's 17U and 19U teams hit the court for the first time since 2019 for the National Championships – with our 19U side returning home with a silver medal and our 17Us finishing a valiant fourth.

In a testament to the talent in our teams, South Australians won the Most Valuable Player award in both age divisions – Kayla Graham in 19U and Tabitha Packer in 17U.

The Marie Little Shield for women with an intellectual disability also returned after three years of no competition and our SA Rubies did us proud, bringing home the bronze.

We were also proud to establish the inaugural Community Lottery with My Money House, which raised over \$55,000 in vital funds for SA netball clubs and associations.

The year was a special one for our Adelaide Thunderbirds as we celebrated the team's 25th anniversary. It was amazing to see the athletes don our inaugural colours for Round 3, cheered on by past players and staff who all made their mark on the rich history of our club.

The Thunderbirds recorded their highest membership count in 2022 and hosted their largest ever SSN crowd at our blockbuster Adelaide Entertainment Centre match. The Pink Army – our members and fans – are truly the best supporters in the league.

During the year, Tippah Dwan and Lucy Austin made their debuts in the pink dress, becoming Thunderbird #104 and #105 respectively. And I'm proud to say South Australian umpires Georgina Sulley-Beales and Rebecca Fergusson received SSN contracts for 2022.

Post-season, life-long friends and teammates Lucy Austin and Georgie Horjus represented the Green and Gold at the Fast5 Netball World Series – winning the competition for Australia for the first time.

I must also thank our incredible commercial partners for their unwavering support across the year – it means a great deal to our organisation to align with like-minded organisations who share our passion for sport and women's sport in particular.

And finally thank you to the Netball SA Board and Chair Carolyn Mitchell – volunteers all - for their hard work and dedication, and of course to the staff of Netball SA for their unrelenting passion for growing netball.





# **MEMBERSHIP**

In 2022, Netball SA's Development Team was pleased to increase its number of regional visits with 13 visits delivered across the State.


In addition, Netball SA was excited to launch Netball on the Road. This new initiative is an all-encompassing program featuring a mix of coaching, officiating, physical and wellbeing activities as well as sessions to help develop and grow the strength of associations. In its inaugural year, the Netball SA team visited four regions: the South East, Murraylands, Lower North and the Eyre Peninsula.

Following the initial pilot with summer associations in 2021, the changeover of competition management systems from MyNetball to PlayHQ was completed this year with all associations making the transition.

In conjunction with the changeover to PlayHQ, the membership structure undertook an evaluation and was revamped to a more streamlined annual fee model.

Netball SA's fortnightly Game Plan newsletter, created especially for associations and clubs, continued to provide content on governance, funding opportunities, products and pathways and club development.

WOOLWORTHS NETSETGO

Woolworths NetSetGO is a national product, providing children between the ages of 5-10 years an opportunity to progressively develop netball skills.

In 2022, the GO tier was not mandatory for the 9&U competition, providing associations the option to run either a GO competition or 9&U. Netball SA assisted 1592 participants in registering to a Net, Set or GO program in 2022.

Woolworths NetSetGO on-court activations were held at two of the Adelaide Thunderbirds' seven home games, with a total of 40 program participants involved across the season. Bridgewater Netball Club, Trinity College, Gawler and Penola Netball Club were the lucky centres to participate out on court.

In 2022, Netball SA announced its inaugural Woolworths NetSetGO Centre of the Year at the Netball SA Gala Awards. Barmera Netball Club were recognised on the night for their dedication to rebuilding the Woolworths NetSetGO program after a few tough years with declining numbers and opportunities due to the impacts of COVID. Their dedication and support of all players, regardless of ability or experience, has seen the group thrive and build strong skills and passion for the sport, which is a credit to all involved.

2022 also saw the launch of Netball SA's Woolworths NetSetGO week marketing campaign to celebrate the program and provide come and try opportunities, coaching workshops and education on the benefits of the program for new participants.

# WALKING NETBALL

# **NETBALL ON THE ROAD**

Walking Netball continued to grow once again in 2022. A modified version of traditional netball appropriate for any age or fitness level, it attracted a range of participants in its second year. Walking Netball is aimed at improving health outcomes by encouraging physical activity, improving strength, balance, and fitness, as well as helping people stay active and social. The main focus is fun and participation.

The Netball SA program offers two key arms of the program: the activity sessions where participants practice their skills and improve their fitness and mobility in a fun and casual environment, as well as the Walking Netball competition where teams or individuals can nominate to play in a casual competition.

Originally launched at Netball SA Stadium, the program is now offered at The Lights, Lightsview and Noarlunga with Port Lincoln and Willunga to be launched in October.





Netball SA launched its inaugural Netball on the Road program in 2022, taking a range of clinics, educational sessions and development programs across South Australia.

In its first year, the program was held in four regional areas: the South East, Eyre Peninsula, Murraylands and the Lower North and recorded over 1,800 people in attendance.

40 different programs were offered from coaching, umpiring and governance to player skills, club culture and everything in between.

Netball SA's inaugural First Nations Clinics were also incorporated into the program, offering free introductory and development opportunities to First Nations youth in regional communities.

Seven regional schools were visited, including visits and clinics with athletes from the Adelaide Thunderbirds side.

The regions for the 2023 Netball on the Road program are: Central Ranges, Fleurieu Peninsula, Yorke Peninsula, Riverland, and Upper North.

# **COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Held annually on the June long weekend, the Country Championships event attracts the best regional talent from across the state to Netball SA Stadium to participate in the three-day competition.

More than 1,100 players from 25 associations competed across 100 teams over 511 matches in 2022.

In addition, The Advertiser live streamed the event, bringing the competition to the communities of associations and supporters who were unable to attend.

Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara claimed the Seniors A Grade title, while Whyalla took out the Seniors B Grade.

Netball SA extends its sincere thanks to the Country Championships Organising Committee for the dedication and hard work put into this year's competition.

In 2022, the Hospital Research Foundation Group Adelaide Thunderbirds School Holiday clinics experienced its most successful year to date, with 1,614 participants aged 5–16 years attending the clinics.

Adelaide Thunderbirds squad athletes attended all clinics, providing a great opportunity for young South Australian netballers to meet and learn from their idols.

A key focus at the clinics was for participants to learn and interact with Netball SA Community Coaches and Adelaide Thunderbirds athletes. Netball SA aims to provide a consistent, positive and memorable experience to all participants.

2022 saw the introduction of a boys clinic and an all abilities clinic providing increased opportunity and access to our sport.

The July clinics recorded the highest ever participation of any clinic.



### SCHOOL PROGRAMS 8,071 SPORTING SCHOOLS 8,071 PARTICIPANTS 400 THUNDER CUP PARTICIPANTS 11% INCREASE FROM 2021

Netball SA continues to provide opportunities for primary and secondary school students throughout South Australia to engage in netball, primarily through the Sporting Schools Program and Subway Thunder Cup competition.

### **SPORTING SCHOOLS**

The Sporting Schools program is an Australian Government initiative designed to help schools increase children's participation in sport and to connect them with community sporting opportunities.

In 2022, over 8000 students participated in the Sporting Schools program across 47 primary schools and 17 high schools throughout the state.

### SUBWAY THUNDER CUP

Subway Thunder Cup is a participation-based competition for schools. The weekly competition,

delivered in Terms 2 and 3, enables children from years 3 - 8 to play netball and develop their skills in a weekly competition held at Netball SA Stadium.

The program saw 400 students participating across the three age groups, representing a growth of 21% from 2021.

# **80** ATHLETES SELECTED IN THE PROGRAM

Netball SA first established its Academy Program throughout South Australia in 2002 for talent identified players, coaches and umpires to help them reach their potential.

In 2022, the program was restructured and rebranded as the Adelaide Thunderbirds Talent Academy – a pilot program designed to prepare athletes between the age of 14 and 16 for state trials and future pathways.

Four locations across SA were established - Keith, Whyalla, Freeling and Mount Barker - with up to 20 athletes per location who received mentoring from Adelaide Thunderbirds athletes Georgie Horjus, Maisie Nankivell, Hannah Petty and Tayla Williams.

Four High Performance and/or Elite Head Coaches were selected: Brian Lines, Kirsty Leonard-Down, Lee-Anne Cummins, and Judy Greenwood, as well as four Assistant Coaches: Michael O'Brien, Kylie Petherick, Alana House, and Jo Mclean.

Athletes benefited from specialist training, including extracurricular activities such as nutritional education, sports psychology, sleep education and fitness testing.

The program included three regional sessions and two overnight camps with all athletes attending in Adelaide.

Results from a player survey conducted at the conclusion of the year revealed 79% of athletes 'strongly agreed' that they developed as an athlete over the course of the program and the remaining 21% 'agreed'.

In addition, 88% of parents felt the program assisted in preparing their child for state trials and future pathway opportunities.

As a result, 12 athletes from the Adelaide Thunderbirds Talent Academy were selected in Netball SA's 2023 17U State Team Squad – representing 48% of the squad.

The Adelaide Thunderbirds Talent Academy will continue to evolve in 2023 as Netball SA works with key stakeholders across the community to ensure the best program for future generations.

# WOOLWORTHS SOUTH AUSTRALIAN RUBIES

The South Australian Woolworths Rubies compete in the Marie Little Shield - named in honour of disability netball pioneer, Marie Little OAM.

First introduced in 2013, the annual tournament provides women with an intellectual disability the chance to compete at a national level.

After a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19, the event made its long-awaited return in October with South Australia set to defend its title from 2019.

The event took place at Netball Central, Sydney Olympic Park from Wednesday 26 to Friday 28 October 2022.

Athletes were presented with their dresses by the Adelaide Thunderbirds before heading away to the championships.

After a strong performance, the Woolworths Rubies claimed bronze in the 2022 Marie Little Shield.

# SAASTA ABORIGINAL NETBALL ACADEMY

The South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy (SAASTA) Aboriginal Netball Academy provides Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander high school students with a unique program of educational outcomes and netball development.

The netball component of the academy saw students participate in the Foundation Coaching Accreditation, Beginner Umpire Workshop, skill development and match play opportunities against Henley High School, St Mary's College, SEDA College and Pulteney High School.

SAASTA students also completed subjects that go towards their SACE. Over two years, students can study either Stage 2 Sports Science or Aboriginal Studies. They can also study a Certificate III VET option such as Sport and Recreation, Community Services, or Fitness and Hospitality.

In 2022, 21 athletes were selected in the Aboriginal Netball Academy with the program delivered every Thursday at St Clair Recreation Centre during the school year.

In preparation of the SSN First Nations Round, SAASTA Aboriginal Netball Academy students collaborated with local Indigenous artist, Shane Cook to design artwork for the 2022 Adelaide Thunderbirds shoes. The athletes were presented their shoes at a First Nations Premier League match and were then worn by the Thunderbirds players during the two SSN First Nations rounds.

SAASTA students also participated in the First Nations dress presentation to the athletes which followed a traditional cleansing ceremony.

## FIRST NATIONS FRAMEWORK



In 2022, Netball South Australia launched a First Nations Framework which outlined how Netball SA actively contributes to increasing participation and development of Indigenous netballers in South Australia.

As part of the framework, key programs were launched including First Nations Clinics, First Nations Athlete Participation Scholarships, Rising Sisters Aboriginal Netball Program and the return of Nunga Netball Carnival.

The framework also supported the continuation of several activities including the collaboration with local artists in the Adelaide Thunderbirds space, celebration of First Nations Round in both Suncorp Super Netball and The Hospital Research Foundation Group Premier League competitions.

Netball SA staff, Adelaide Thunderbirds athletes and board members also undertook a cultural awareness session in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history and culture.

# VANESSA DEMPSEY AWARD

Named after its inaugural winner, proud Ngarrindjeri, Narungga and Jingili woman, and well-known member of the Netball SA community, Vanessa Dempsey, the award aims to celebrate the outstanding achievements in this important space and forms part of Netball SA's commitment to reconciliation.

The Seaford Storm Netball Club was awarded the 2022 Award for their commitment to the engagement and support of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander netball participants and communities.

For Seaford Storm, reconciliation is at the forefront of everything they do, as reflected in their statement: 'for us, reconciliation is everyday, not just a week'.

After launching the design of their reconciliation bibs in 2021 - designed by Aboriginal club member Kadence of the Meintangk, Tanganekald, Bunganditj, Kaurna, Narungga and Ngarrindjeri people - the club has expanded on this in 2022.

Over the last 12 months, they have sold over 100 reconciliation hoodies, with all funds donated to Aboriginal charities and in 2022, they continued to fundraise by launching their charity tote bags.

In addition, the club hosted an Indigenous Round at their home courts and invited all clubs to join in acknowledging the traditional owners of the land and paying respects to Aboriginal people past, present and emerging.

# THE HOSPITAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION GROUP PREMIER LEAGUE



The Hospital Research Foundation Group Premier League is South Australia's pinnacle netball competition, comprising of the state's best talent and fiercest rivalries.

It provides athletes, coaches, umpires and officials with a highly competitive environment to showcase and develop their skills and is also an important feeder program for national opportunities within the netball pathway.

In 2022, the competition was elevated through a partnership with Newscorp who live streamed a double header of League and Reserves every round and all of the finals series.

The partnership increased exposure and media coverage of the competition, taking the Premier League to new and existing audiences.

First Nations Round was held over two rounds – 5 and 6 – and for the first time, all eight clubs wore a First Nations dress design.

Contax Netball Club and Garville Netball Club hosted a Heritage Round, donning dresses that paid homage to their inaugural outfits and celebrating their shared history as two of South Australia's most influential netball clubs.

Oakdale Netball Club and Contax Netball Club competed in a curtain raiser match for the Adelaide Thunderbirds at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre.

In League, Contax finished minor premiers and the Matrics Netball Club were minor premiers in Reserves.

The competition hosted a record crowd at Netball SA Stadium for the Grand Finals, with 1,962 tickets sold as Matrics went on to claim the premiership in both League and Reserves.


# ADELAIDE THUNDERBIRDS

# **NETBALL SA STADIUM**





In 2022, membership and ticketing were supported by the 'Rich Roots, Fierce Future' campaign, which celebrated the Adelaide Thunderbirds' 25th anniversary year. The campaign was integrated across digital advertising and media, as well as radio and outdoor thanks to partnerships with SAFM and JC Decaux.

The Adelaide Entertainment Centre margue match was a key priority, with efforts in this space rewarded with the match recording the highest ever attendance of any Adelaide Thunderbirds Suncorp Super Netball match to date with over 7,000.

Netball SA's partnership with Newscorp's live streaming arm KommunityTV continued to evolve as the company live-streamed one double header of every round as well as every finals match of The Hospital Research Foundation Group Premier League for the first time.

This historic addition to the partnership created unprecedented exposure and media coverage of the competition, taking it to new heights and new audiences in 2022.

Ongoing advertising to support school holiday clinics recorded a positive return on investment, with the 2022 participation numbers reaching new records of 1,614 participants.

As several major netball competitions returned for the first time since the outbreak of COVID-19, Netball SA's marketing and communications arm launched campaigns to ensure their exposure.

### **DIGITAL FOLLOWING**



In the wake of COVID-19, Netball SA's marketing and communications arm implemented a strong digital strategy to elevate exposure across owned channels.

As a result, the 'Mazda Thunder Plays' match highlights campaign reached over 2 million accounts on Instagram alone by utilising the platform's current algorithms and maximising on trends.

Media opportunities were optimised across the business including coverage across television, digital, radio, print and broadcast.

# **OUR PARTNERS**

We welcomed My Money House as a corporate partner, who facilitated our inaugural Netball SA Community Lottery. The lottery was a huge success, with over \$50,000 raised for netball clubs across metro and regional South Australia and an array of cash and other prizes.

Woolworths also renewed their partnership with Netball SA as part of a broader partnership with Netball Australia, launching naming rights of the NetSetGO program to support the next generation of South Australian netballers.

# OPERATING PERFORMANCE

Following a few difficult years impacted by significant COVID-19 interruptions across all netball competitions, the easing of restrictions enabled netball in South Australia to return to a sense of normality.

While the year was not entirely without interruption or the impact of COVID, it was a marked improvement on previous years and provided an opportunity for the Board and management team to re-set the business, re-focus on key stakeholder relationships and review the short-term strategic direction of netball in South Australia, which resulted in a strong improvement in the financial performance of Netball SA.

We are pleased to announce that Netball SA recorded an operating surplus (excluding depreciation and noncore items) of \$304,476, representing an improvement from the previous year of \$936,248.

This result was driven by excellent and growing participation numbers from clubs and associations which delivered increased association membership revenue and entry fees. This was also supported with



improved utilisation of spare stadium capacity which contributed to increases in revenue for facility hire and food and beverage. Despite the improved operating performance, sponsorship revenue remained relatively flat and will be a focus going forward.

After taking into account non-cash depreciation, Netball SA incurred a net deficit for the year of \$56,327. This is compared to a surplus of \$2,073,328 in 2021 (which was as a result of revenue recognition for COVID related Job Keeper and Government subsidies and a one-off government capital grant for the stadium upgrade).

In line with increased inflation and as we expanded the capacity of the business in line with volume growth, expenses also increased. There was also the need during the year to invest in stadium maintenance and repair costs as the infrastructure continues to age.

For the coming year Netball SA's focus will be to continue to work with the netball community to strengthen the financial position and focus on long term financial sustainability.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2022

### **NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The financial statements cover South Australian Netball Association Incorporated as an individual entity. South Australian Netball Association Incorporated is an association incorporated in South Australia and operating pursuant to the Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

### New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

South Australian Netball Association Incorporated ("the association") has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB") that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have a significant impact on the financial performance or position of the association

### **Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

### Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also required management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the association's accounting policies. The ears involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant, are disclosed in note 1(o)

### **Accounting Policies**

### Income Tax (a)

South Australian Netball Association Incorporated is not subject to income tax and therefore no income tax expense or income tax payable is shown in the financial statements.

### (b) Fair Value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

### (C) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

The cost of fixed assets constructed within the association includes the cost of materials, direct labour and borrowing costs.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss during the financial period in which they are incurred.

### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line or diminishing value basis to write off the net cost of each item of property. plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Buildings and leasehold improvements Plant & equipment Furniture, fixtures & fittings Computer equipment

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the association. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing net proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they occur. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation relating to that asset are transferred to retained surplus.

### Impairment of non-financial assets (d)

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued individual asset is identified, this is recognised against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that class of asset.

### (e) Employee Provisions

Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Shortterm employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The association's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages, salaries and sick leave are recognised as a part of current trade and other payables in the statement of financial position.

### Other long-term employee benefits

Provision is made for employees' annual leave entitlements not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Any remeasurements of obligations for other long-term employee benefits for changes in assumptions are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur.

The association's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current provisions in its statement of financial position, except where the association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date, in which case the obligations are presented as current provisions.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents (f)

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

### (g) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from customers in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Accounts receivable are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment. Refer to Note 1(d) for further discussion on the determination of impairment losses.

### Revenue recognition (h)

The association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

### Sales revenue

Events and fundraising revenues are recognised when received or receivable.

### Grant income

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Once the assets and liabilities have been recognised then income is recognised for any difference between the recorded asset and liability

### Capital grants

Capital grants received under an enforceable agreement to enable the association to acquire or construct an item of property, plant and equipment to identified specifications which will be controlled by the association (once complete) are recognised as revenue as and when the obligation to construct or purchase is completed.

For construction projects, this is generally as the construction progresses in accordance with costs incurred since this is deemed to be the most appropriate measure of the completeness of the construction project as there is no profit margin.

For acquisitions of assets, the revenue is recognised when the asset is acquired and controlled by the association.

### Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

### Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

### (i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

### (j) Inventories

Inventories held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### (k) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liabilities outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

### (I) Contract liabilities

Contract liabilities represent the association's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer and are recognised when a customer pays consideration, or when the association recognises a receivable to reflect its unconditional right to consideration (whichever is earlier) before the association has transferred the goods or services to the customer.

### (m) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

### (n) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

### Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements (o)

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

### (i) Useful lives of property, plant & equipment

The association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

### (ii) Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1(e), the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

For the purpose of measurement, AASB 119: Employee Benefits defines obligations for short-term employee benefits as obligations expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. As the association expects that all of its employees would use all of their annual leave entitlements earned during a reporting period before 12 months after the end of the reporting period, the association believes that obligations for annual leave entitlements satisfy the definition of short-term employee benefits and, therefore, can be measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid to employees when the obligations are settled. (iii) Accruals

The Accruals at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the accruals are payable. A payable provision is included for any accrual where the entire balance is not considered received. The provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

### (iv) Performance obligations under AASB15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied.
